New Programs.

SUBJECT: University of Oklahoma. Approval to offer the Doctor of Philosophy in Planning,

Design, and Construction.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents approve the University of Oklahoma's request to offer the Doctor of Philosophy in Planning, Design, and Construction with the stipulation that continuation of the program will depend upon meeting the criteria established by the institution and approved by the State Regents, as described below.

• **Doctor of Philosophy in Planning, Design, and Construction.** Continuation beyond Fall 2019 will depend upon meeting the following criteria:

Majors enrolled: a minimum of 16 students in Fall 2018; and Graduates: a minimum of 3 students in 2018-2019.

BACKGROUND:

Academic Plan

The University of Oklahoma's (OU) Academic Plan lists the following institutional priorities and new funding initiatives:

- Continue aggressive recruitment of large freshmen classes and improve the processing of graduate student applications for admission.
- Continue improving the undergraduate retention and graduate rates by 1) utilizing the holistic admissions to be able to provide early invention/mentoring/tutoring for students whose profiles suggest they will profit from such aggressive intervention, 2) increase the coordination of undergraduate academic advising across campus, and 3) enhance course offerings during the summer session. Additionally, we will work to get undergraduate students actively working towards a timely and, therefore, more efficient timeline for their degree completion.
- Continue to manage undergraduate course offerings to adequately meet student needs for courses by requiring course sections to be fully enrolled and by adding sections as needed to meet student demand by utilizing qualified instructors, lecturers, and other adjunct instructors

APRA Implementation

In August 1991, the State Regents launched the Academic Planning/Resource Allocation (APRA) initiative, which was based on the principle that institutional officials would prioritize their programs and activities, and then fund higher priority activities at levels that ensured quality. In times of flat or declining budgets or financial constraints, institutions are expected to reallocate resources from lower

priority activities to higher priority activities, rather than reducing quality by funding lower priority activities at the same rate as higher priority activities.

Since 1992, OU has taken the following program actions in response to APRA:

Program Review

OU offers 261 degree and/or certificate programs as follows:

10	Certificates

All of these programs were reviewed in the past five years with the exception of those programs with specialty accreditation. Programs with specialty accreditation are aligned with OU's program review schedule as appropriate. Thus, if a professional program received a ten-year accreditation, it would not be reviewed for ten years, which is an approved exception to State Regents' policy.

Program Development Process

OU's faculty developed the proposal, which was reviewed and approved by institutional officials. OU's governing board approved delivery of the Doctor of Philosophy in Planning, Design, and Construction at the January 25, 2012 meeting. OU requests authorization to offer this degree as outlined below.

POLICY ISSUES:

This action is consistent with the Academic Program Approval policy.

ANALYSIS:

Doctor of Philosophy in Planning, Design, and Construction

Program purpose. The purpose of the proposed degree program is to provide the education and training needed to prepare students to become faculty members in the discipline.

Program rationale and background. Recent trends in practice and in academia demonstrate a growing need for advanced degrees in the Architecture disciplines. In practice, the increasing complexity of the construction industry, technological advances, and a renewed focus on energy efficiency has led to a growing demand for research related to the built environment and for interdisciplinary collaboration. Therefore, there is an increased demand for researchers to produce new knowledge about the built environment. In academia, the built environment is viewed as an indicator of cultural expression and of national identities. Buildings and cities have become subject to the same rigorous intellectual examination that has typically been associated with disciplines like history, literature, and the social sciences. Consequently, there is an increased need for faculty with doctoral degrees who understand the methods by which these links can be made and who can guide students to contribute to these new fields of study. The proposed program will be unique in that one area of focus is that of the American Indian built

environment in the western United States. This area is a virtually unexplored topic from the viewport of the Architecture disciplines. The National Council of Architectural Registration Boards show that the number of schools offering a doctoral degree in Architecture has doubled in the past twelve years. OU has had several qualified students from across the United States inquire about a doctoral program in the College of Architecture. In response to the emerging need, OU faculty believe they are uniquely situated to capture this growing market by developing the proposed program.

Employment opportunities. Job growth for individuals holding an advanced degree in the architecture discipline is expected to increase over the next ten years. For individuals interested in pursuing faculty positions, the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture shows that 58 percent of the current positions for faculty in both research and teaching require a doctorate as minimum qualifications for application and the remaining 42 percent indicate giving preference to individuals holding a doctorate. Careers in other related areas of architecture, such as regional and city planning, interior design, construction and landscape architecture, are also expected to increase. With this increase in job opportunities, along with the surge in retirements from faculty in these disciplines, the demand for individuals with doctoral degrees to replace faculty and researchers also rises. OU is confident that graduates of the proposed program will find employment within the field of architecture.

Student demand. The proposed degree program is expected to meet the enrollment and graduate standards by the established deadline prior to final approval by the State Regents as shown in the following table.

External Review. Doctoral programs represent a long-term commitment for an institution. Faculty, support staff, equipment, facilities and resources are required for research and training doctoral students. This translates to considerable investments in time and funds, therefore institutions infrequently develop new doctoral programs.

For these reasons, two external reviewers, Drs. Kevin Krizek and Guillermo Vásquez de Velasco, conducted a paper review (*i.e.*, no site visit) of the proposed degree program. Dr. Krizek is currently a Professor in the Department of Planning and Design and former director of the Ph.D. Program in Design and Planning at the University of Colorado. Dr. Vásquez de Velasco is the Dean of the College of Architecture and Planning at Ball State University. Both reviewers have extensive experience in the academic area of architecture as well as knowledge of the quality standards required for successful doctoral programs in architecture.

The external evaluators' charge was to assess the viability and quality of the proposed degree program with specific attention to issues of duplication of programs, student demand, productivity standards and funding implications. The evaluators used the State Regents' *Academic Program Approval* policy and background information on the State Regents' Academic Planning and Resource Allocation initiative to frame the review.

The team's overall evaluation included the following findings:

• The program makes effective use of the existing areas of academic strength and builds substantial uniqueness by addressing the field of Native American Studies from the perspective of the professions of the built environment.

- There is no duplication with any program in the state.
- There is a burgeoning market for graduates with such skills and credentials.
- The vision of a single doctoral degree program that articulates all the areas of professional study in the college is commendable.
- The program has a clear and viable market at the state and regional levels and can use this to their advantage to be highly selective in terms of admissions.
- The institution is well provided of the infrastructure needed to support the program.
- The additional resources needed for the initial implementation of the program are not substantial and appear to be available.

The team declared strong support to establish the program at OU. The reviewers agree that developing a Doctor of Philosophy in Planning, Design, and Construction will enhance and is central to the mission of the University of Oklahoma to provide the best possible educational experience for students through excellence in teaching, research, creative activity and services to the state and society. There is a core group of faculty who has the knowledge, experience and skills to initiate the program and build it over time.

While recommending State Regents' approval, the evaluators offered some suggestions for improvement of the proposed program over time:

- The substantive content for the two core courses could warrant additional detail and consideration, particularly in terms of various learning outcomes.
- Support for faculty research and development will need to be further developed and sustained over time. Funds to support a grants infrastructure, mentoring to assist faculty to obtain external grants, and strategic planning for the school's research programs will be necessary over time. Future growth will depend on this. Current faculty research interests appear to be very diverse; strength could be found in developing 'cores' of related research interest areas.
- Overall funding for the program is modest, considering program growth, the need for stipends and tuition, as well as other considerations mentioned above.
- The University/College could possibly aid more in leveraging assistantships, particularly for teaching.
- The program may have a challenge attracting national-level applicants in areas of strength, but not uniqueness. This challenge can be substantially reduced through the opportunity to offer competitive financial offers to high achieving applicants.
- Small student cohorts may not allow for the formal delivery (formal loading) of core courses.

OU responded satisfactorily to these recommendations.

The curriculum for the program meets State Regents' and national curricular standards for architecture programs, as do the proposed admission, retention, and graduation standards. The number of faculty, their level of activity, and scholarly expertise are consistent with successful doctoral programs. To summarize, the evaluators indicated the proposed degree program was of high quality and they strongly supported its implementation.

Duplication and impact on existing programs. There are no Doctor of Philosophy in Planning, Design, and Construction programs offered in Oklahoma. A system wide letter of intent was communicated by email on April 12, 2012. None of the State System institutions notified State Regents' staff of a protest to the proposed degree program. Approval will not constitute unnecessary duplication.

Curriculum. The proposed degree program will consist of 58 total credit hours each as shown in the following table. Two new courses will be added and the curriculum is detailed in the attachment (Attachment A).

Faculty and staff. Existing faculty will teach the proposed degree program. Additional faculty will be hired as needed.

Support services. The library, facilities, and equipment are adequate for this degree program.

Financing. The proposed degree program will be offered on a self-supporting basis and the current tuition and fee structure will be sufficient to adequately fund the program. No additional funding is requested from the State Regents to support the degree program.

Oklahoma's Promise.

SUBJECT: FY2015 Official Funding Estimate for the Oklahoma's Promise Scholarship Program.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents provide to the State Board of Equalization a funding estimate of \$61 million for the cost of the Oklahoma's Promise scholarship program for fiscal year 2015 and further recommended that \$57 million of the funding estimate be allocated from the General Revenue Fund with the remaining \$4 million funded from the program's trust fund reserve.

BACKGROUND:

During the 2007 session, the Oklahoma Legislature passed SB 820 providing a dedicated funding source to ensure full and stable financial support for the Oklahoma's Promise program. By statute, the State Regents must provide a funding estimate to the State Board of Equalization no later than November 1 of each year. The funding estimate is for the fiscal year that begins the following July 1.

The seven-member State Board of Equalization is comprised of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, State Auditor and Inspector, State Treasurer, Attorney General, Superintendent of Public Instruction, and the President of the Board of Agriculture. The Board is responsible for certifying the total amount of funds that the Legislature can appropriate from the state's General Revenue Fund. The Board also has the responsibility to determine the amount of revenue necessary to fund the Oklahoma's Promise scholarships and subtract that amount from the total funds available for appropriation from the General Revenue Fund.

POLICY ISSUES:

The implementation of a dedicated funding source for the Oklahoma's Promise program was a long-standing legislative goal of the State Regents. This funding process helps ensure that the promised financial benefit to students participating in the program will always be fulfilled. It also recognizes that the financial obligation of the Oklahoma's Promise program is an obligation of the state as a whole, not just the state's higher education system.

ANALYSIS:

FY2014-15 Estimate

Based on current data and projections, it is estimated that in 2014-15, the cost of the Oklahoma's Promise program will be \$61 million, a decrease of \$1,700,000 or 2.7 percent from the 2013-14 funding level of \$62.7 million. The number of students expected to receive an Oklahoma's Promise award in 2014-15 is 18,300, down about 1,000 or 5.2 percent from the original estimate of 19,300 recipients in 2013-14.

Factors taken into consideration to calculate the estimates include: (1) the enrollment rates of 8^{th} , 9^{th} , and 10^{th} grade students in the program; (2) the rate at which Oklahoma's Promise high school students qualify

for the scholarship; (3) their high school-to-college going rates; (4) their enrollment patterns at colleges in Oklahoma; (5) their persistence/award-retention rates in college; (6) the average number of semester credit hours in which students enroll; (7) the tuition rates at each institution; and (8) estimated tuition increases.


The cost projections incorporate the following specific assumptions:

• The number of Oklahoma's Promise students enrolled in the 2014 high school graduating class is projected to decline by about 400 students compared to the 2013 graduating class (from about 10,000 to 9,600). Because the \$50,000 family income eligibility limit is not inflation-adjusted, the number of students enrolling in the program in future years is expected to gradually decline.



OKPromise High School Enrollment


(By High School Graduation Year)


- Sixty-four percent (64%) of Oklahoma's Promise students in the high school graduating class of 2014 will qualify for the scholarship.
- About 78 percent of the 2014 high school graduates qualifying for the scholarship will actually enroll in an Oklahoma college and receive the scholarship in 2014-15. This assumption is slightly less than the historical average due in part to the implementation in fall 2012 of a new statutory second family income check that disqualifies students whose family income is more than \$100,000 at the time the student begins college. Approximately 60-90 students in each entering freshmen class are expected to be permanently disqualified by this provision.
- Students receiving the award in college will enroll in an average of about 26 semester credit hours.
- The award-retention/persistence rates of Oklahoma's Promise students in college will be slightly less than prior years due to the implementation of a new statutory requirement that students must meet federal "Satisfactory Academic Progress" standards beginning in 2012-13 and new college GPA requirements that apply to students entering college in 2012 and thereafter.

Projected Scholarship Recipients

The number of Oklahoma's Promise award recipients in college peaked at nearly 20,100 in 2011-12. Since then, the number has gradually declined each year and is expected to continue to decline in future years.

Recommended Sources of Funding for FY2015

It is recommended that the FY2015 funding estimate of \$61 million be allocated from the following sources:

Based on the current reserve balance of the Oklahoma's Promise Trust Fund and projected expenditures, the State Regents recommend that \$4 million be expended from the Trust Fund reserve in FY 2015 for scholarship costs. This amount should allow the Trust Fund to maintain a reserve balance of roughly 15 percent, or about \$10 million at the end of FY 2015. The Trust Fund reserve is necessary to address any variances that may occur between projected and actual expenditures. In addition, since the scholarship award expenditures are not uniform throughout the year, but are concentrated around the months of September and February, the reserve also ensures sufficient cash-flow resources if the state's revenue experience ever restrains the timely allocation of funds. The recommended 15 percent reserve fund balance is also comparable to the level authorized for the state's "Rainy Day Fund" (Constitutional Reserve Fund).

Update of 2013-14 Projected Costs

The most recent projection for 2013-14 actual expenditures is \$60.5 million, \$2.2 million or 3.5 percent less than the \$62.7 million funding level approved by the State Regents in October 2012. Reasons the updated cost projections are less than the original funding estimate include: (1) tuition rates at the

research universities did not increase for the 2013-14 academic year, and (2) award-retention rates of upper level college students are also expected to be slightly less than initial assumptions. <u>Expenditure History:</u> The following table shows the program's history of expenditures since scholarships were first paid in 1996-97.

SUBJECT: Approval to continue an interim proposal regarding the Oklahoma State University

Center for Veterinary Health Sciences policy exception.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the interim proposal approved by the State Regents on May 22, 2009 for Oklahoma State University Center for Veterinary Health Sciences to admit up to thirty (30) - 10 per year - nonresident transfer students in years 2, 3, and 4 from any U.S. veterinary college be continued until an articulation agreement is finalized. As required by policy, qualified Oklahoma residents will be given priority over nonresident students.

BACKGROUND:

Since 1971, the State Regents have set policy for the function, admissions, academic and program standards, setting a cap on the number of enrollments, and limiting the number of nonresident students for the Oklahoma State University Center for Veterinary Health Sciences (OSU-CVHS). The current cap on incoming students is 80; 25 percent may be nonresident students.

In December 2008, OSU-CVHS requested and received approval from the State Regents to develop an articulation agreement with the University of Arizona (UA). The exception allowed enrollment of 40 UA transfer students in the third and fourth years. Subsequently, in May 2009 OSU-CVHS requested and received approval for an interim proposal which allows up to 30 second, third and fourth year transfer students (10 per curriculum year) admission into OSU-CVHS, effective Spring 2010. The interim proposal was requested to allow OSU-CVHS additional time to evaluate and finalize its 2+2 articulation agreement with the UA. A complete report was submitted and is analyzed below.

Since State Regents' approval of the interim proposal in May 2009, it was determined that additional time is needed to finalize the articulation agreement with another university. The interim proposal was submitted to maximize existing capacity through expanded transfer of nonresident students while OSU-CVHS continues deliberations related to the articulation agreement. The Regents for the Oklahoma State University and Agricultural and Mechanical Colleges approved the interim proposal at the April 17, 2009 meeting.

POLICY ISSUES:

The request is for continued approval of the amendment to the approved exception to the Professional Programs section 3.26.9.B.6 granted by the State Regents on December 4, 2008.

ANALYSIS:

OSU-CVHS re-emphasizes that there is a need to increase veterinary graduates to address a shortage in several areas including public practice, rural practice, and academia and a significant imbalance in the types of practicing veterinarians. Increasing the number of OSU-CVHS graduates from approximately 75-80 per year to approximately 100 per year through nonresident recruitment from other states would help address the need and utilize existing capacity.

Since initial approval was granted in 2008, tuition and fee revenue has increased by approximately \$1,702,486 between Fall 2009 and Spring 2013, which has been instrumental in maintaining academic quality during a time of economic and financial constraint.

Since 2009, several changes have occurred in veterinary education programs across the country. Two private, not-for-profit programs have received reasonable assurance of accreditation by the Council of Education of the American Veterinary Medical Association, of which one program is located within the state of Arizona. The UA has entered into negotiations with the private school in Arizona to establish an articulation agreement and OSU-CVHS reports that the original proposal to partner with OSU to establish an articulation agreement is no longer feasible.

In Spring 2012 OSU-CVHS was approached by and entered into negotiations with University of Arkansas-Fayetteville (UA-F) to explore a 2+2 articulation agreement with its College of Agriculture, Food, and Life Sciences. UA-F is currently examining its curriculum to determine what changes are necessary to ensure a relatively seamless transition by its students into the OSU-CVHS veterinary program.

Continuation of the interim proposal will allow up to 30 second, third and fourth year transfer students (10 per curriculum year) admission into the OSU-CVHS. OSU-CVHS will not request additional state funding to continue the interim proposal and revenue from the additional nonresident students will continue to fund faculty, administration and updating facilities. As required by policy, qualified Oklahoma residents will be given priority over nonresident students. The interim proposal will be phased out once an articulation agreement with the UA-F is finalized or when it is determined an articulation agreement is no longer feasible.

It is recommended that the interim proposal as described above be continued to allow OSU-CVHS time to develop an articulation agreement with the UA-F. An annual progress report on the UA-F articulation agreement will be required in a format outlined by State Regents' staff.

SUBJECT: Renee Neuwald Memorial Scholarship – Repeal of Policy.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents repeal the policy for the Renee Neuwald Memorial Scholarship.

BACKGROUND:

The Renee Neuwald Memorial Scholarship was created in 2000 to honor the lifelong contributions of Renee Neuwald to the teaching profession. Ms. Neuwald was a middle school and high school teacher in Houston and Tulsa. The scholarship was funded by private donors, two of which were the daughters of Ms. Neuwald. The State Regents agreed to administer the funds and adopted the program policy in April 2000.

The scholarship was limited to graduates of the Tulsa High School of Science and Technology (formerly named McLain High School and now named McLain High School for Science and Technology). Between 2000-2001 and 2010-2011, a single \$1,000 scholarship was awarded each year to a graduate of the high school.

Annual contributions to the scholarship fund by the private donors in excess of the annual scholarship expense generated a fund balance of \$9,282 by 2011. In 2011 the private donors decided to move the administration of the scholarship and the scholarship fund balance to the University of Oklahoma Foundation.

POLICY ISSUES:

None.

ANALYSIS:

Since the administration and funding for the Renee Neuwald Memorial Scholarship have been transferred to the University of Oklahoma Foundation, the State Regents' policy related to the program should be repealed. University or community foundations are probably more appropriate entities to administer small private-funded scholarships like the Renee Neuwald Memorial Scholarship since the foundations already handle numerous similar scholarships.

The recommendation to repeal the policy was posted on the agenda of the State Regents' meeting on September 5, 2013.

5.10 RENEE NEUWALD MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

5.10.1 Purpose

- A. This scholarship is to honor the lifelong contributions of Renee Neuwald to the teaching profession.
- B. The goal of the Renee Neuwald Memorial Scholarship is to provide scholarship opportunities to outstanding students with financial need who are graduates of Tulsa High School of Science and Technology in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

5.10.2 Eligibility Requirements

- A. To be eligible for the Renee Neuwald Memorial Scholarship, an applicant shall
 - 1. Be an Oklahoma resident.
 - 2. Graduate from Tulsa High School of Science and Technology in Tulsa, Oklahoma with a grade point average of 3.00 or better.
 - 3. Demonstrate financial need.

5.10.3 Nomination and Selection of Recipients

- A. Tulsa High School of Science and Technology shall nominate five to six students to the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education by March 15th of each year.
- B. Sponsors of the Neuwald scholarship will select one student from the nominees to be awarded. The State Regents will notify the student and Tulsa High School of Science and Technology of the award.

5.10.4 Fiscal Limits

A. Scholarships will be awarded on a yearly basis and are not renewable.

SUBJECT: Council on Information Technology policy.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents approve the proposed edits of State Regents' policy for the Council on Information Technology.

BACKGROUND:

The Council on Information Technology (CoIT) is comprised of information technology officers from each institution and higher education center in the State System. CoIT considers technology and related issues affecting Oklahoma higher education, proposed technology and related policy and procedures, and serves as the principal statewide advisory council rendering advice and counsel to the Chancellor in the review of current and recommended technology and related policy and procedures.

POLICY ISSUES:

This item is consistent with Regents' practice on adoption of policy revisions.

ANALYSIS:

The revisions include a better defined membership, what members will have voting privileges and committee and meeting participation.

It is recommended that the State Regents' approve the attached changes to the Council on Information Technology policy.

2.20 COUNCIL ON INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

The Council on Information Technology (CoIT) considers technology and related issues affecting Oklahoma higher education, proposed technology and related policy and procedures, and serves as the principal statewide advisory council rendering advice and counsel to the Chancellor in the review of current and recommended technology and related policy and procedures. In performing these responsibilities, the CoIT renders service to the whole State System, including coordination with the Chief Information Officers (CIO) for the Oklahoma State System of Higher Education and communicating with various bodies such as the Council on Instruction, the Council on Student Affairs, the Council of Business Officers, and others.

The CoIT also serves as a forum when information technology officers meet to discuss matters of common interest and, when appropriate, conducts studies and issues reports designed to strengthen the mission of Oklahoma higher education institutions.

2.20.1 Membership

Members of the Council on Information Technology shall be comprised of principal information technology officers (or the "top-most" information technology position) from each institutional campus and higher education center (as appropriate) in the State System. In the event the principal information technology officer is unable to participate on the Council, he/she may propose to the Chair of the Council an information technology professional, from their campus, as their delegate to the Council acting on their behalf. Any such proposal will be presented to the Executive Committee for consideration. If approved, the delegate will be considered a voting member of the Council. A representative from the independent sector may be invited by the Council's Executive Committee to serve on the Council and shall be selected from nominations provided by the Independent College Association. A representative from the independent sector will be invited by the Council's Executive Committee to serve on the Council and shall be selected from nominations provided by the Independent College Association.

2.20.2 Voting Privileges

Members shall have equal standing. No voting privileges will transfer to an assigned delegate should the principal officer be unable to attend Council meetings. Only CoIT members are eligible to vote. CoIT members shall have equal standing with only one vote from each institutional campus and higher education center (as appropriate) in the state system.

2.20.3 Officers

Officers of the CoIT shall consist of a Chairperson and Chairperson-Elect. Each officer shall serve a term of one fiscal year beginning July 1st and ending June 30th.

Duties of the Chairperson include:

- Preside at the CoIT meetings.
- In concert with State Regents' Staff, prepare the agenda for the CoIT meetings.

Appoint committees to study issues as needed.

The Chairperson-Elect shall serve in the capacity of chairperson during the absence of the chair. On a rotating basis, and by tier (comprehensive, four-year/regional and two-year), the Chair Elect shall come from the nominations received from the tier whose term it is to serve as Chair the following year. Elections will occur during the June Council meeting.

Once the Chair Elect is confirmed by a majority of the Council present at the June meeting, two members from each tier shall be designated (by tier) to serve on the Executive Committee. The tier whose term it is to have member serve as chair or chair elect shall designate only one additional member.

2.20.4 Committees

Committees shall be chaired by a member of the <u>CoIT as named by the Executive Committee</u>, the <u>Executive Committee</u> and shall meet on an as-needed or predefined basis.

The Chairperson may recommend formation of ad-hoc committees to study specific issues of interest to the Council. Non-CoIT members may be named to standing and ad-hoc committees as deemed necessary to aid in the work of the committee. Non-CoIT members that are officially named to the committee by the CoIT Chair shall attend committee meetings and have voting privileges within that committee. Resource persons may also be named to committees by the Committee Chair but shall be non-voting members of the committee.

The Council may form or dissolve standing committees and ad-hoc committees by a two-thirds vote of the members who are present.

Standing committees shall consist of:

- Executive Committee
- Bylaws and Procedures Committee
- Research Committee
- Policy and Legislative Issues Committee
- Technology Committee
- Cross-Institutional Policies and Partnerships Committee

A. Executive Committee

Shall develop a slate of issues to be discussed and/or addressed by the council during the year to ensure timely management of matters affecting technology and related university welfare. Executive committee will meet prior to each Council meeting either in person or via teleconference or videoconference.

B. Bylaws and Procedures Committee
Responsible for assessing the adequacy for the Council's operating
procedures and proposing, when warranted, amendments to the bylaws

and Operating Procedures.

C. Research Committee

As required shall develop and present reports and/or studies pertaining to issues affecting information technology in the State System.

D. Policy and Legislative Issues Committee

Shall identify technology-related matters which have legislative oversight or legislative implications. When needed, the committee, along with the State Regents' staff will provide appropriate advice and counsel.

E. Technology Committee

Shall present topics and/or issues the council would like to know more about or discuss during monthly meetings. These will included, but not be limited to, hardware, equipment, software, networking, personnel, policies, and procedures as related to technology for the State System or that may be of interest to Council members and their respective institutions.

Cross-Institutional Policies and Partnerships Committee

Shall identify topics and/or areas of potential collaboration with regard to system IT functions and responsibilities. In addition, the committee will research and investigate relevant policies that could either facilitate the expansion of institutional partnerships or hinder their formation.

2.20.5 Meetings

Meetings of the Council shall be held bi-monthly in conjunction with State Regents' meetings and other councils. Meeting dates shall be announced on the CoIT <u>Wiki</u> Website at the beginning of each fiscal year.

As deemed necessary and appropriate, the Council may hold meetings at other places and locations as recommended by the chair of the Council and with consent of Council members.

<u>Designees</u> and non-COIT members may be invited to attend Council meetings and other events when pre-approved by the Council.

2.20.5 Parliamentary Procedure

The generally accepted rules of parliamentary procedure for small legislative bodies shall govern in the deliberation of the Council, and unless specifically altered in these procedures, the latest edition of *Roberts Rules of Order* shall be the controlling guide in such practice.

<u>Amendments</u> - Any members of the Council may propose changes to these Bylaws. Proposed changes become effective when approved by two-thirds of the Council in attendance.

SUBJECT: Approval of revisions to the investment policy target asset allocation.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents approve the of revised investment policy target asset allocation table.

BACKGROUND:

The investment policy outlines the responsibility of the State Regents to determine a recommended asset allocation policy and approval of investment managers. In response to the current financial market environment and recent legislative changes, Mercer Hammond Inc. has recommended that the target asset policy be shifted to a greater equity exposure with a corresponding reduced allocation to fixed income and cash. The policy changes was posted at the September 2013 meeting of the State Regents.

POLICY ISSUES:

This item is consistent with Regents' practice on adoption of policy revisions.

ANALYSIS:

The following changes in TABLE B of the investment policy asset allocation targets are recommended to slightly shift the asset allocation targets to more equity and less fixed income and cash. It is recommended that the proposed changes be approved by the State Regents.

Rebalancing Among Asset Classes

Because each asset class and sub-class portfolio will perform differently in any single measurement period, rebalancing is intended to maintain the portfolio's exposure to various asset classes within stated ranges.

The Investment Committee, in consultation with the Investment Consultant, will be responsible for adjusting asset classes when manager limits are violated or when an asset class is outside a $\pm 20\%$ boundary of the current targeted allocation. Rebalancing will be considered by the Investment Committee at least quarterly. Cash flows into and out of the portfolio will be used to rebalance to the target asset allocations. Additional rebalancing requirements will be met by shifting assets among the various portfolios, taking into account the liquidity constraints posed by the particular investment vehicle and management style.

Illiquid Assets

The ranges on the prior page have been created using long-term capital market performance expectations, as illiquid alternative assets are expected to outperform traditional liquid assets. An investment portfolio just beginning its illiquid investments typically needs 5-7 years to become fully invested. These assets do not, however, allow for rebalancing actions as quickly as the liquid asset classes. Therefore, we acknowledge that from time to time, these assets may breach their targeted maximum or minimum allocations. If that should occur, steps will be taken to remedy the situation in as efficient and prudent a manner as possible.

SUBJECT: Allocation of Funds.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents approve an allocation in the amount of 30,000 to the University of Central Oklahoma for the 14^{th} annual Regional University Research Day.

BACKGROUND:

University of Central Oklahoma is hosting the 2014 Regional University Research Day. The State Regents' support enables students to attend the day-long poster display and symposium without cost. An estimated 800 students from regional universities will participate.

For FY 2014, the State Regents approved an allocation of \$2,576,836 for Oklahoma EPSCoR projects.

POLICY ISSUES:

This recommendation is consistent with State Regents' policy and actions.

ANALYSIS:

University of Central Oklahoma requests \$30,000 in support for the fourteenth annual research exposition and symposium. This support provides display boards, flyers, program, expenses for speakers and judges and other meeting expenses. The State Regents along with several additional sponsors have agreed to host this annual event. The event will be held in March 2014.

Master Lease Program.

SUBJECT: Master Lease Purchase Real Property Program.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents authorize for submission to the Council of Bond Oversight the 2013 Real Property Master Lease Series. The total projects from ten entities amount to approximately \$70.91million.

BACKGROUND:

The Oklahoma State Legislature approved in May 1999, Senate Bill 151, which authorized the State Regents to establish a master lease program. State System entities may enter into lease agreements for projects having a project value of \$50,000 up to a maximum of \$10 million. The terms of the lease agreements will vary by the useful life of the equipment purchases. In May 2005, the legislature expanded the authorization to include financing of the acquisition of or improvements to real property. This group of projects was submitted for legislative review as required by statute.

In May 2013, the Oklahoma Development Finance Authority requested a validation of the program from the Oklahoma Supreme Court. An initial hearing was held before the Court on June 27, 2013, and the Court rendered a validation that upholds the program as constitutional on September 24, 2013.

The State Regents' office works in conjunction with the Oklahoma Development Finance Authority (ODFA) to administer this program with each institutional lease purchase agreement submitted to the Council of Bond Oversight for approval. The institutional governing boards will have given prior approval of all projects submitted under this program before the bonds are issued.

POLICY ISSUES:

The recommendation is consistent State Regents' policy.

ANALYSIS:

The Master Lease Purchase Program provides the State System entities a method of financing major personal and real property acquisitions at significant efficiencies from both financing aspects and administration. This program is designed to provide flexibility in acquiring equipment and new or renovated construction projects by allowing lease purchase payments or debt service payments to be made on a monthly basis from current capital and operating funds. Individual sub-lease agreements will be entered into with each participating institution and the State Regents, under the terms of the Master Lease Purchase Agreement. The institution's fee structure shall be based on the individualized purchase package and interest rates available on the day of bond pricing.

The 2013 series for real property includes ten system institutions with an estimated total of approximately \$70.91 million in projects. The following table summarizes this series of project totals by institution with project descriptions provide by each institution following. Each of the listed projects was submitted for legislative review as required by statute and were considered approved due to no action taken. A legislative review hearing on the projects was conducted on February 13, 2013.

Connors State College – Renovation of A.D. Stone Student Union

\$5,500,000

The project will consist of renovation approximately 31,850 square feet in an existing, one-story building on the Warner campus. The renovation will include kitchen, cafeteria, ballroom, student activity, office space, campus and community rooms and computer labs. The project will be funded through an existing Student Union Fee.

Connors State College – Nursing Allied Health Facility

\$8,000,000

Construction of a 33,000 square feet facility to house Nursing and Allied Health education, laboratories, classrooms, student activities and services space, and faculty offices to be located at the Muskogee, Three Rivers Port Campus. Debt service will be funded through student tuition and fee revenue.

East Central University - Renovation School of Education

\$5,000,000

This project will renovate existing classrooms, restrooms, faculty offices, and student lounges and labs in the School of Education building. The basement of the building will also be renovated to establish the Center for Undergraduate Learning. The University will use Section 13 Offset and other capital funds for the required debt service.

Murray State College – Refinancing Student Housing

\$4,000,000

Built in 2007, MSC Aggie Suites student housing was funded with a loan through US Department of Agriculture. Over the past several years, interest rates have continued to drop to a point where refinancing the existing debt will help the college realize savings in interest payments. Housings revenues will be used to defease the debt.

Murray State College – Deferred Maintenance & Renovations

\$6,000,000

Program and enrollment growth along with aging facilities have created a situation where some learning spaces cannot be utilized efficiently. While minimalizing to the extent that our resources permit, space or size limitations hamper growing programs and enrollment. This project will renovate many of those areas. Section 13 Offset funding will be used for debt service

Northeastern OK A&M College - Renovation of Shipley Hall

\$4,000,000

Renovation to include window replacement, electrical wiring, roof repair and replacement, HVAC upgrades and flooring. This project will be funded through existing student tuition and fees.

Northeastern OK A&M College – Synar Campus Renovations

\$1,145,000

General improvements and renovations to include equine breeding barns and stalling barns. The farm renovation will be funded through an existing infrastructure fee and course fees for those that utilized the facilities.

Northern Oklahoma College – Student Housing Upgrades - Tonkawa

\$5,000,000

Construction of a 100 bed residence hall facility and/or renovation of the existing residence halls on the Tonkawa campus. Housing revenue will be used to defease the debt.

Northern Oklahoma College - Student Housing Upgrades - Enid

\$5,000,000

Construction of a 100 bed residence hall facility and/or renovation of the existing residence halls on the Enid campus. Housing revenue will be used to defease the debt.

Rogers State University – Student Housing Project

\$12,000,000

The project is part of the on-going expansion of house on the Claremore campus. The complex will consist of one and two bedroom furnished suites. The complex will include on each floor a common gathering room and several study areas. Security cameras, card reader exterior door access, wireless internet and laundry facilities will also be included. The complex will be designed using energy efficient components and will include residence office, storage rooms, parking lot and exterior parking lights and landscaping. Housing revenue will be used to defease the debt.

Southeastern Oklahoma State University – Refunding Student Union Bonds

\$5,915,000

Refinancing of the existing Student Union Bonds to realize an estimated savings. The original term will not be extended. The project is being funded through an existing student union fee.

Seminole State College – External Relations Center

\$750,000

Construction and furnishing approximately 7,600 square feet office building to house grant programs, other externally funded directed programs, student activity programs and general offices. The project is being funded through Section 13 Offset funds.

Southwestern Oklahoma State University – Renovation of University Housing

\$5,000,000

This project will provided initial funding for a multi-year project to renovation and upgrade all student university housing on the Weatherford campus. Our current housing units were constructed between 46 and 76 years ago and all need upgrading to meet the current needs of our students. This is a major strategic plan goal for SWOSU's five-year plan. Housing revenue will be used to defease the debt.

SUBJECT: Endowment Trust Fund Investment Performance Report and Annual Distribution

Schedule.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents approve a distribution of 4.5 percent of the June 30 market value totaling to the amount of \$23.2 million for fiscal year 2013, and \$26.7 for prior years' carryover-- totaling approximately \$49.9 million-- for institutional expenditure from eligible Endowment Trust Fund accounts and approve the corresponding account reports for the year-ended June 30, 2013.

BACKGROUND:

With the allocation at the May 25, 2013, meeting, the State Regents have allocated a total of approximately \$253.6 million to the Endowment Trust Fund for chairs, professorships and lectureships and from state appropriations since inception of the program in 1988. The last several years' allocations are dedicated to bond debt service. The 2008 legislature increased the debt service for endowed chairs bonding authority by \$4,899,645, for a current total allocation of \$11.6 million.

These allocations are to support the establishment of faculty chairs and professorships and for related activities to improve the quality of instruction and research at colleges and universities in the State System. State Regents have also allocated \$29.1 million for the Langston University Endowment since 1999. In addition to state funding, the fund contains private matching funds and unrestricted gifts.

In September 2003, the endowment distribution policy was revised to allow for 4.5 percent of the three-year average market value at June 30 to be available for distribution. This revision became effective with the FY04 distribution. Also, included for the fourteenth year is the available distribution for the Langston University Endowment.

POLICY ISSUES:

Investments for the Endowment Trust Fund have been made in compliance with the State Regents' investment policy and relevant State Statutes.

STAFF ANALYSIS:

The market value of the trust fund was \$625.7 million, as of June 30, 2013. In FY13, the fund posted a gain of approximately 3.8 percent, net of fees.

The State Regents' current investment policy provides that "the investment committee shall determine the distribution...The distribution will not necessarily be equivalent to actual earnings during the year, but to maintain a distribution rate from year to year that, as a goal, will approximate 4.5 percent of the asset values based on an average of the past three years for the endowment trust fund." The attached distribution schedule reflects the distribution available for each eligible Endowment Trust Fund account and is presented for approval.

SUBJECT: Approval of FY-2014 Purchases in excess of \$100,000.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents approve FY-2014 purchases for amounts that are in excess of \$100,000.

BACKGROUND:

Agency purchases are presented for State Regents' action. They relate to previous board action and the approved agency budgets.

POLICY ISSUES:

The recommended action is consistent with the State Regents' purchasing policy which requires State Regents' approval of purchases in excess of \$100,000.

ANALYSIS:

The items below are in excess of \$100,000 and require State Regents' approval prior to issuing a purchase order.

Purchases Over \$100,000

Core

1) Visual Image Advertising in the amount of \$197,500.00 for advertising for the Reach Higher Program including statewide advertising, two year institution's collaborative media buy and Northeastern State University in Tahlequah advertising buys. (Funded from 210-Core).

OCAP

- 2) Staplegun Design, Inc.in the amount of \$290,000.00 for a media campaign that is centered on increasing the awareness of and affinity for the Oklahoma Promise scholarship program. This media campaign will target parents of children who qualify for the program. (Funded from 701-OCAP).
- 3) Student Outreach Solutions Inc. in the amount of \$583,333.33 to provide student grace period and cohort management services on both Federal Direct and FFELP loans to certain state system schools and state technology schools with the most recently published 3-year cohort default rates pursuant to 34 C.F.R. 668.183(b) in excess of 10%, with the goal to reduce the cohort default rates for these schools. These services are in addition to and are not intended to replace the

default aversion services currently performed by OCAP on existing OCAP FFELP portfolio. (Funded from 701-OCAP).

OneNet

- 4) Expenditure request from OneNet in the amount of \$220,000.00 to purchase a replacement uninterruptible power supply (UPS) system for the Oklahoma City data center. The majority of OneNet above-the-net services are provided from this data center and current UPS systems are nearing end of service life. (Funded from 718-OneNet).
- 5) Presidio in the amount of \$160,000.00 to purchase high-speed storage for Oklahoma City and Tulsa. The storage will provide required performance increase and additional capacity to OneNet's infrastructure and hosting services. (Funded from 718-OneNet).

SUBJECT: Acceptance of the FY 2013 Annual Audit Reports.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents accept the annual FY2013 Audit Reports.

BACKGROUND:

The State Regents' are required by statute to conduct an annual financial audit by an outside independent auditor. This is the second of five years that Stanfield & Odell has served our agency as independent auditor.

POLICY ISSUES:

This item is consistent with State Regents' policy.

ANALYSIS:

The State Regents' independent auditor, Stanfield & Odell, has completed the annual audit of operations and programs for the year ending June 30, 2013. The following reports are included with this item:

- Independent Auditor's Report on Financial Statements for the State Regents Operations including Compliance Reports required under OMB Circular A-133 and a Schedule of Findings and Ouestioned Costs, if any.
- Independent Auditor's Report on Financial Statements for the Oklahoma College Assistance Program.

The Independent Auditor's Report on Financial Statements for the State Regents Operations consolidates all operations for which the State Regents have responsibility. Operations fall into two categories: (1) Core administrative operations that involve those activities directly related to carrying out the State Regents' constitutional responsibilities, and (2) Special Programs that involve several programs assigned to the State Regents including the Oklahoma College Assistance Program (OCAP), the Oklahoma Tuition Aid Grant Program, and ONENET. A separate Independent Auditor's Report on Financial Statements for the Oklahoma College Access Program has been prepared to meet OCAP reporting requirements and other needs.

The Compliance Reports required by the Federal Office of Management and Budget under OMB Circular A-133 relate only to programs funded by the federal government. These reports focus on internal control and compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, grants, and contracts applicable to the federal programs. There were no findings or questioned costs.

Professional standards also require the auditors to communicate certain matters concerning the financial reporting process. To facilitate this communication, the auditors have also prepared a letter providing this information.

It is recommended that the State Regents accept the FY 2013 Audit Reports.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents approve new investment managers and allocation of funds for the endowment trust fund.

BACKGROUND:

Mercer Hammond, investment consultants for the fund, has suggested new manager recommendations for consideration. These managers will continue to diversify our fund portfolio and meet the objectives of realignment to the policy asset class targets.

POLICY ISSUES: This action is consistent with Regents' asset allocation policy.

ANALYSIS:

Mercer is recommending the following managers for the portfolio:

Cedar Rock Capital - \$20 million. This firm's portfolio is concentrated in global equities and has a buy and hold approach to investing. Their key investment theme is finding companies that provide a high return on capital without requiring debt. The firm believes that high quality companies exhibit a number of traits and most importantly, have the ability to earn a sustainable high return on capital over the long-run.

Oaktree US Senior Loan Fund - \$13 million. Oaktree has a long-established pedigree in managing high-yield assets. The overriding focus of this strategy is on down-side protection and a conservative philosophy. Oaktree actively manages its capacity versus expected high-yield issuances. The investment process is comprehensive, using a transparent scoring methodology to identify and rank a multitude of macro and micro risks on an issue by issue basis.

Suspending programs is consistent with the State Regents' Academic Program Review policy. Institutions have three years to reinstate or delete suspended programs. Students may not be recruited or admitted into suspended programs. Additionally, suspended programs may not be listed in institutional catalogs.

ANALYSIS:

EOSC requested authorization to suspend the Associate in Applied Science in Ammunition Management and Safety (078)

- EOSC reports that this program was developed for ammunition interns at the Defense Ammunition Center located in McAlester. Due to the increase in defense cuts and the reduced demand for ammunition specialists, the need for interns has been eliminated.
- EOSC will reinstate or delete the program by October 30, 2016.

Authorization was granted by the Chancellor for the above request. State Regents' ratification is requested.



RECOMMENDATION:

This item is for information only.

BACKGROUND:

At the May 1994 meeting, the State Regents delegated authority to the Chancellor to approve minor exceptions and clarifications to Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE) policies that will not result in a broad scale circumvention of policy. All exceptions are requested by the president and supported by extenuating circumstances and are to be reported to the State Regents on a quarterly basis. This is the 56th report of exceptions to academic policy granted by the Chancellor.

An exception to the OSRHE Undergraduate Degree Requirements policy, which states that a minimum of 15 hours of resident credit applied toward the associate degree shall be taken at the awarding institution, exclusive of correspondence work and physical education courses, was granted to a RSC student. The exception allowed RSC to apply 7 credit hours from Oklahoma State University-Oklahoma City (OSU-OKC) to comprise the 15 hour resident credit minimum at RSC. The exception was based on the fact RSC and OSU-OKC have an articulation agreement regarding the police science option of the Associate in Science in Criminal Justice and recommendation of the president.

Tulsa Community College (TCC)

August 14, 2013

An exception to the OSRHE Institutional Admission and Retention policy, which states that a student who is academically suspended twice from the same institution may not return to the suspending school until the student has demonstrated the ability to succeed academically by raising his or her GPA to the retention standards by attending another institution, was granted to a TCC student. The exception allowed readmission of the student and was based on documentation of the student's commitment to

successfully completing his college degree, the recommendation of the TCC Academic Appeals Executive Council, and the president.

Western Oklahoma State College (WOSC)

May 20, 2013, August 23, 2013, and August 28, 2013

Three exceptions to the OSRHE Institutional Admission and Retention policy, which states off-campus high school concurrent enrollment courses be taught by regular faculty whose primary employment is as a faculty member at the institution delivering the course, were granted to WOSC to allow specified faculty to teach concurrent enrollment courses. Two of the policy exceptions allowed courses to be taught at the Southwest Technology Center and the Hobart Campus of Western Technology Center. Additionally, a third policy exception was granted to WOSC to allow a specified faculty member to teach a concurrent course online to both high school and traditional college students. These three exceptions were based on the fact that the instructors met the qualifications of a regular, full-time faculty member as approved by the department chair, dean of the college offering the course, and recommendation of the president.

SUBJECT: Postsecondary Institutions Operating in Oklahoma: Summary of Accreditation Status.

RECOMMENDATION:

This item is for information only.

BACKGROUND:

State Regents' staff monitors the accreditation status of all institutions awarding college credit and degrees in Oklahoma. Out-of-state regionally or nationally accredited institutions that operate a physical site in Oklahoma annually report information to the State Regents regarding their accreditation status and education activity to the Chancellor. A summary of accredited institutions is provided annually to the State Regents.

It is not possible to monitor out-of-state institutions delivering courses and programs electronically to Oklahoma when no in-state physical site is used. Out-of-state institutions operating a physical site in Oklahoma via electronic technology are expected to follow the standards of "best practices" in distance learning as detailed in the Institutional Accreditation policy and procedures.

POLICY ISSUES:

Based on Oklahoma Statutes, the State Regents' Institutional Accreditation policy and procedures requires public and private institutions awarding college credit to maintain accreditation status through one of the following: 1) regional accreditation [one of six agencies recognized in the United States], 2) state accreditation through the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE), or 3) accreditation through a national agency recognized by the United States Department of Education.

The Institutional Accreditation policy requires nationally accredited institutions operating in Oklahoma to comply with Consumer Protection provisions by prominently disclosing 1) their accreditation status and 2) the transferability of courses in publications (transfer allowed on a course-by-course basis at the discretion of the receiving institution). Additionally, out-of-state institutions that are not regionally or nationally accredited must seek OSRHE accreditation and follow procedures outlined in the policy to operate in Oklahoma.

ANALYSIS:

A matrix outlining the accreditation status of postsecondary institutions operating in Oklahoma is attached. Currently, no institutions are accredited by the OSRHE. A summary for 2012-2013 of the 64 institutions operating in Oklahoma and the respective accreditation affiliation is provided below.

SUBJECT: Salaries in the Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, 2012-2013 Faculty and

Selected Administrative Positions.

RECOMMENDATION:

This is an information item recommended for the State Regents' acceptance.

BACKGROUND:

Colleges and universities in the State System provide annually aggregate salary and benefit data for faculty by rank and for selected administrative positions. This information is compiled and analyzed in an enclosed supplement and provides a valuable resource for college administrators, governing boards, the coordinating board, the Governor, and the Legislature for both immediate and long-range planning. An historical analysis of national faculty salary trends compared to Oklahoma is also included.

The average faculty salary for all full-time faculty equated to a 9-10 month contract basis in Oklahoma state-supported colleges and universities, excluding the constituent agencies, is \$64,977 for the year 2012-2013. This is an increase of \$623 or 1.0 percent above 2011-2012. The total number of full-time faculty in Oklahoma's 25 colleges and universities (not including constituent agencies) in 2012-2013 is 5,032, an increase of 28, or 0.6 percent, over 2011-2012. When the constituent agencies are included, the total for the system is 6,785, an increase of 210 or 2.3 percent above the previous year.

The 2012-2013 salaries range from a low of \$11,760 to a high of \$295,900 on a 9-10 month basis and from \$3,060 to \$372,300 for contracts on an 11-12 month basis. This data excludes salaries for deans and other administrative personnel.

The data shows that fringe benefits have slightly decreased by 0.7 percent for 9-10 month faculty and by 1.9 percent for 11-12 month contracts. The average benefit package for 9-10 month faculty is \$23,322 and \$30,305 for 11-12 month faculty. Institutions have made a focused effort to minimize increases in the benefits through changes in providers and benefit packages offered to their employees.

When compared to national salary averages, Oklahoma's salaries show a slight increase in relative averages in all tiers, 80.59 compared to 79.94% last year. The research universities average salary is 89.56 percent of the national average. Four-year universities are 86.24 percent of the national average and two-year colleges are at 78.01 percent of their national average.

SUBJECT: Preparing for College Mass Mailing.

RECOMMENDATION:

This item is for information only.

BACKGROUND:

In January 1999 the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education announced an aggressive plan to increase the proportion of Oklahomans holding a bachelor's degree from 20 to 28 percent by 2010 and the proportion of associate degree holders from 5 to 10 percent. Called Brain Gain, the plan was designed to move Oklahoma from the bottom to the top one-third of all states for its educational and economic performance. The State Regents are seeking to add more college degree holders to the state's population by focusing on three areas – increasing the proportion of Oklahomans who earn a college degree, keeping more Oklahoma graduates in the state and attracting college degree holders from outside the state.

Additionally, in 1997 the Citizens' Commission on the Future of Oklahoma Higher Education recommended that the State Regents expand efforts to explain the services Oklahoma higher education offers to Oklahoma and Oklahomans and the benefits the state and its citizens receive from those services.

For the 21st consecutive year, the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, in a joint effort with the Oklahoma College Assistance Program (OCAP), undertook a mass mailing of publications designed to help 8th-12th grade students better prepare for college. Many of the materials include information that has been specifically requested by 8th-12th grade counselors through annual surveys.

POLICY ISSUES:

This initiative is consistent with recommendations made by the Citizens' Commission on the Future of Oklahoma Higher Education in October 1997 to better publicize higher education services and benefits.

Eighth- Thru 10th-Grade Students... What's Your Plan for College? Oklahoma's Official Guide to Preparing for College

High School Juniors & Seniors... What's Your Plan for College? Oklahoma's Official Guide to Preparing for College

Nearly 232,000 brochures on preparing for college were distributed to head counselors at Oklahoma public and State Department of Education-accredited private schools for distribution to each 8th-12th grade student in their schools. This is the 11th year that separate, grade-specific brochures were produced. Approximately 146,300 brochures focusing on early academic and financial planning for college were distributed to 8th-10th grades, and approximately 85,700 brochures focusing on academic requirements and financial aid were sent to 11th-12th grades. The brochures were also sent statewide to home school organizations, libraries, educational organizations such as TRIO, Job Corps locations, and tribal and faithbased organizations. Online versions of both brochures are also available on the State Regents' and OCAP websites. The brochures are designed to inform students of the courses they must take in high school to be admitted to an Oklahoma state college or university. They also detail admission standards, placement score and financial aid information. In addition, they encourage students to call the State Regents' toll-free Student Information number or visit the www.OKcollegestart.org website for additional information. The brochures also feature a map of Oklahoma public colleges and universities with phone numbers and website addresses, as well as estimated college costs, hourly wage comparisons for various jobs, financial planning information and tips for choosing the right college. This is the 21st year these brochures have been produced.

Counselor's Resource Book: Oklahoma's Colleges and Universities

Approximately 560 copies of this publication were distributed to counselors at public and private high schools. At least one resource book was sent to each Oklahoma high school with 12th-grade students. Copies were also sent statewide to home school organizations, libraries, educational organizations such as TRIO, Job Corps locations, and tribal and faith-based organizations. In lieu of traditional binding, the resource books are three-hole punched for placement in a notebook so the information can be easily duplicated. Students, counselors, parents and others are also encouraged to access the online version on the State Regents' website. The resource book provides a short profile of each college and university in Oklahoma and includes information on preparing for college, concurrent enrollment, transfer, college costs and financial aid. In addition, it provides a glossary of college-related terms; publicizes the State Regents' toll-free Student Information number and the www.OKcollegestart.org website; and includes a section for international students, with information on English language requirements, costs, Oklahoma weather and culture, student populations and more. The resource book is produced in coordination with the Communicators Council. This is the 18th year it has been produced.

Are You Looking for Money? Paying for College with Grants, Scholarships, and Federal Loans

Approximately 500 copies of the "Are You Looking for Money?" publication were distributed to counselors at public and private high schools. Copies were also sent statewide to home school organizations, libraries, educational organizations such as TRIO, Job Corps locations, and tribal and faith-based organizations. Each Oklahoma high school with 12th-grade students received one copy of the booklet plus a bookmark with information on ordering additional materials. The booklet is designed to be a "one-stop" reference guide of information about grants, scholarships and federal education loans for students. The booklet is also available online on the State Regents' and OCAP websites.

- 9. ACT ANNUAL REPORT. Dr. Cindy Brown, Director of Student Preparation, provided Regents with an overview of the annual report on the ACT scores for the 2013 graduating class. She noted that Oklahoma's composite scores, reading scores, and science reasoning scores increased. She also noted that although mathematics scores remain the lowest for Oklahoma testers, the average remained at a high of 20.1. Regent Massey made a motion, seconded by Regent Turpen, to accept the ACT Annual Report. Voting for the motion were Regents Helm, Parker, Holloway, Glass, Harrel, Turpen, Massey, and Stricklin. Voting against the motion were none.

10. E&G ALLOCATION.

MINUTES OF THE COMMITTEE-OF-THE-WHOLE Wednesday, September 4, 2013

- 1. ANNOUNCEMENT OF FILING OF MEETING NOTICE AND POSTING OF THE AGENDA IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE OPEN MEETING ACT. The Committee-of-the-Whole met at 10:30 a.m. on Wednesday, September 4, 2013, in the Regents Conference Room at the State Regents' offices in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Notice of the meeting was filed with the Secretary of State on November 6, 2012. A copy of the agenda had been posted as required by the Open Meeting Act.
- 2. CALL TO ORDER. Participating in the meeting were Regents Toney Stricklin, Jay Helm, Ann Holloway, Ike Glass, Jimmy Harrel, Mike Turpen, and John Massey. Regent Harrel called the meeting to order and presided.
- State Relations for Complete College America, provided Regents with an update on the national Complete College America initiative. Currently 34 states are included in the Complete College America Alliance of States. She stressed the elements of a successful college completion goal and added that Oklahoma is currently including all of those elements in its Complete College America initiative. Chancellor Glen D. Johnson shared that in the first year of the initiative, Oklahoma exceeded its goal of 1,700 additional degrees by awarding 2,945 new degrees and certificates. Mr. Tony Hutchison, Vice Chancellor for Strategic Planning and Analysis and Economic and Workforce Development, explained that each campus in Oklahoma was assigned a specific goal for the Complete College America initiative and that these goals and other CCA metrics had been incorporated into the higher education funding formula.

Regent Stricklin asked about the ongoing public belief that there are no jobs for college degree holders and that the marketplace instead is looking for skilled technical workers. Ms. Raymond responded that Complete College America includes those with one-year certificates or above. She also stressed that the degrees must be tailored to match the needs of the local businesses and manufacturers.

Regent Turpen asked about the impact of student debt on college completion initiatives. Ms. Raymond responded that financial aid incentives could be included in the initiatives.

Chairman Harrel thanked Ms. Raymond for her presentation. He added that the needs of the workforce are constantly changing and that higher education must remain active in order to meet those needs.

- 4. OKLAHOMA COLLEGE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM. Mr. Rick Edington, Executive Director of the Oklahoma College Assistance Program (OCAP), provided Regents with an update on student loan issues. He discussed changes to the structure of student loans based on the FY2014 federal budget and the Bipartisan Student Loan Certainty Act.
- **5. BUDGET REPORT.** Ms. Amanda Paliotta, Vice Chancellor for Budget and Finance, Information Technology, Telecommunications, and OneNet, provided Regents with an update on

the FY2015 budget outlook. She advised Regents that based on collections through the end of FY2013, that revenue had increased over the prior year by approximately \$40 billion. She noted, however, that the Rainy Day fund deposit of \$2.7 million for FY2013 was the lowest in three years. Current budget estimates would be based only on July collections. Vice Chancellor Paliotta reminded Regents that the most robust report of revenue would be available following the December meeting of the Equalization Board.

Vice Chancellor Paliotta also provided Regents with an overview of the budget process and timeline. Institutions will receive their budget needs forms for FY2015 in mid-September and will have 3-4 weeks to complete and submit to the State Regents' office. The State Regents will take action on the FY2015 budget request at their special meeting on Thursday, November 7, 2013.

- 6. CONGRESSIONAL VISIT. Chairman Harrel welcomed Oklahoma Congressman James Lankford and asked him to address the Regents. Congressman Lankford thanked Regents for their service to Oklahoma and discussed the impact of higher education on the state and national economy. He also discussed issues relating to student loans and No Child Left Behind. Finally, Congressman Lankford discussed the current issue with Syria, stating that there were no good solutions.
- **7. EXECUTIVE SESSION.** Regent Massey made a motion, seconded by Regent Glass, to go into executive session for confidential communications with attorneys concerning pending investigations, claims, or actions. Voting for the motion were Regents Helm, Holloway, Glass, Harrel, Turpen, Massey, and Stricklin. Voting against the motion were none.

Following executive session discussions, Regents returned to open session.

8. INSTITUTIONAL UPDATES.

a. University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma. Chairman Harrel welcomed President John Feaver, University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma (USAO), and asked him to provide an update on the institution's Mission Enhancement Plan (MEP). President Feaver discussed the history of the university and its unique mission as the state's only public liberal arts university. Over the past several years, USAO has increased admissions standards and is now on par with the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma State University.

President Feaver discussed the discrepancy in the public's perception of USAO as a regional university, rather than a public liberal arts university, and asked for State Regents' help in resolving the issue, noting that the institution does not have the marking power to change public perception across the state. Chancellor Johnson responded that the State Regents have shown continuing support for USAO through the allocation of additional funds toward the Mission Enhancement Plan and through the re-designation of USAO as the state's public liberal arts university on all published materials. Regent Stricklin asked President Feaver to develop a detailed proposal to bring to Regents including specific ways in which the State Regents' might help to differentiate USAO as the state's public liberal arts university.

b. Redlands Community College. Chairman Harrel welcomed Interim President Jack Bryant, Redlands Community College (RCC), and asked him to provide Regents with an update on the institution's revised FY2014 budget. Interim President Bryant reported that the revised budget will show that RCC has paid approximately 70 percent of outstanding

debts and has plans to pay the remainder by the end of the calendar year. He added that this was achieved through focused cost cutting and by working with the school's largest creditors to set up payment plans. Regents thanked Interim President Bryant for the outstanding work he and his staff achieved over the summer.

9. TASKFORCE REPORTS.

- a. Online Education Task Force. Dr. Blake Sonobe, Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, provided Regents with an update on the State Regents' Online Education Task Force. He reported that the Policy Audit subcommittee had completed its review of policies and found no barriers to a future Online Education initiative. Other items still under discussion by the Policy Audit subcommittee include tuition and fees, admissions standards, course load limits, and intellectual property policies. Dr. Sonobe reported that the E-Core subcommittee continues discussions regarding course quality and academic integrity. He added that faculty training was also discussed, with the subcommittee determining that it should training for those faculty teaching online should be mandatory.
- b. Safety and Security Task Force. Ms. Angela Caddell, Interim Director of Communications, provided Regents with an update of the work of the State Regents' Safety and Security Task Force. She reported that the task force had organized into three workgroups: campus best practices; issue monitoring and advocacy research; and training and plan development. Each workgroup has established chairs and vice chairs and will meet on their respective topics throughout the year.
- **10. LEGISLATIVE UPDATE.** Ms. Hollye Hunt, Associate Vice Chancellor for Legislative Affairs, provided Regents with an update on the approved interim studies.
- 11. STEM UPDATE. Chancellor Johnson provided Regents with a report of Governor Mary Fallin's STEM Summit, held on Tuesday, August 20, 2013. Over 300 individuals attended, representing business and industry, higher education, and career technology. The summit included two separate panel discussions from business and industry leaders and a panel discussion from education leaders. Mr. Norm Augustine, former CEO of Lockheed-Martin, provided the luncheon address. Chancellor Johnson noted that Mr. Augustine's address detailed the importance of higher education in the growth of STEM industries.
- **12. "BEST OF HIGHER EDUCATION" REPORT.** Regents received the May 2013 update on institutional activities.
- **13. ADJOURNMENT.** With no other items to discuss, the meeting was adjourned.
